Looking up at the Milky Way on a warm, clear night gives me great joy and perspective. I'm just a hiccup on Earth's time line. But my insignificance is significant. The odds of me being here are billions (trillions? quadrillions?) to one. But here I am.

The older I get, the better I realize what I do or don't do isn't going to affect the trajectory of the universe. Depressing? Not at all. What I realize is I might as well do something that pleases me; something that in a tiny, tiny way makes the world a better place; something that gives more than it takes.

Everyone needs their own Big Empty. Some find it in the ocean or a mountaintop or a quiet meadow or a serpentine stream. Where isn't important. What is important is to visit it now and then. For there you will find yourself waiting for you.

Douglas Keister is an internationally renowned photographer who has photographed, authored, and co-authored 46 critically acclaimed books.
