As an Owyhee County, Idaho, rancher, I also had an up-close-and-personal experience with Marvel. He told me, "I'm going to get rid of you and your cows." I asked, "How can I take that?" He responded, "Any way you want to!" A coincidence? Our pickup was sabotaged, fences cut, gates opened, and the BLM notified by Marvel's associates when cattle moved into unauthorized areas.
