I AM NOT OPPRESSED

In August 2021, Derrick Wilburn, the founder and president of Rocky Mountain Black Conservatives, spoke at a meeting of the Colorado Springs District 49 School Board, during which the topic of "Critical Race Theory" was discussed. The video of his speech went viral and galvanized a movement that led the school board to ban CRT in its schools. This is what he said:

I am the direct descendent of the North American slave trade. My parents are black. My grandparents are black. All eight of my great-grandparents are black, and all 16 of my great-greats. On my mother's side, my ancestors were enslaved in Alabama. On my father's side, we were enslaved in Texas.

Me and my children, we are not "victims" of America. We are not victims of some unseen 190-year-old force that kind of floats around in the ether. Putting Critical Race Theory into our classrooms is taking our nation in the wrong direction.

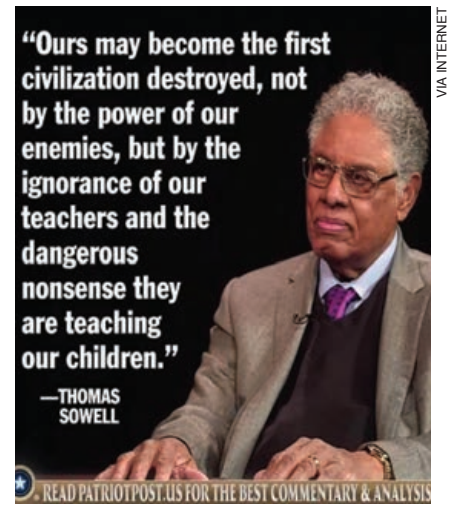
