


NATIONAL WITHERING

TEXAS AGREES TO TWO-STATE SOLUTION

AUSTIN, TX—In what has been talked about as a "last-ditch attempt" to avoid all-out war, Texas has announced it has agreed to a two-state solution with the city of Austin. Officials hope this distinction will help calm decades of growing hostilities in the region. The solution will divide the region into two states, Texas and the Democratic Socialist Republic of Austin.
